

Central Park Golf Course – Tree Planting and Nature Recovery

High density planting

Purple areas are dense planting with a lot of small trees, which in time will become pockets of woodland and a haven for wildlife.

Woodland edge

Yellow areas will be left to grow and will, in time, become a grassy woodland edge. This is the area of woodland where many different types of wildlife can be found.

Benches, signage and interpretation

We plan to add several benches around the course, as well as some new signage for the golf holes to better understand which direction you are putting, throwing or kicking!

Wildlife meadow

Blue areas are wildlife meadows. This is where we will allow longer grass and wildflowers to grow over spring and summer. This will provide homes and food for insects, small mammals (like hedgehogs) and birds.

In autumn, these areas will be cut and bailed (the cuttings will be taken away and composted in Central Park) which creates a better environment for flowers to grow.

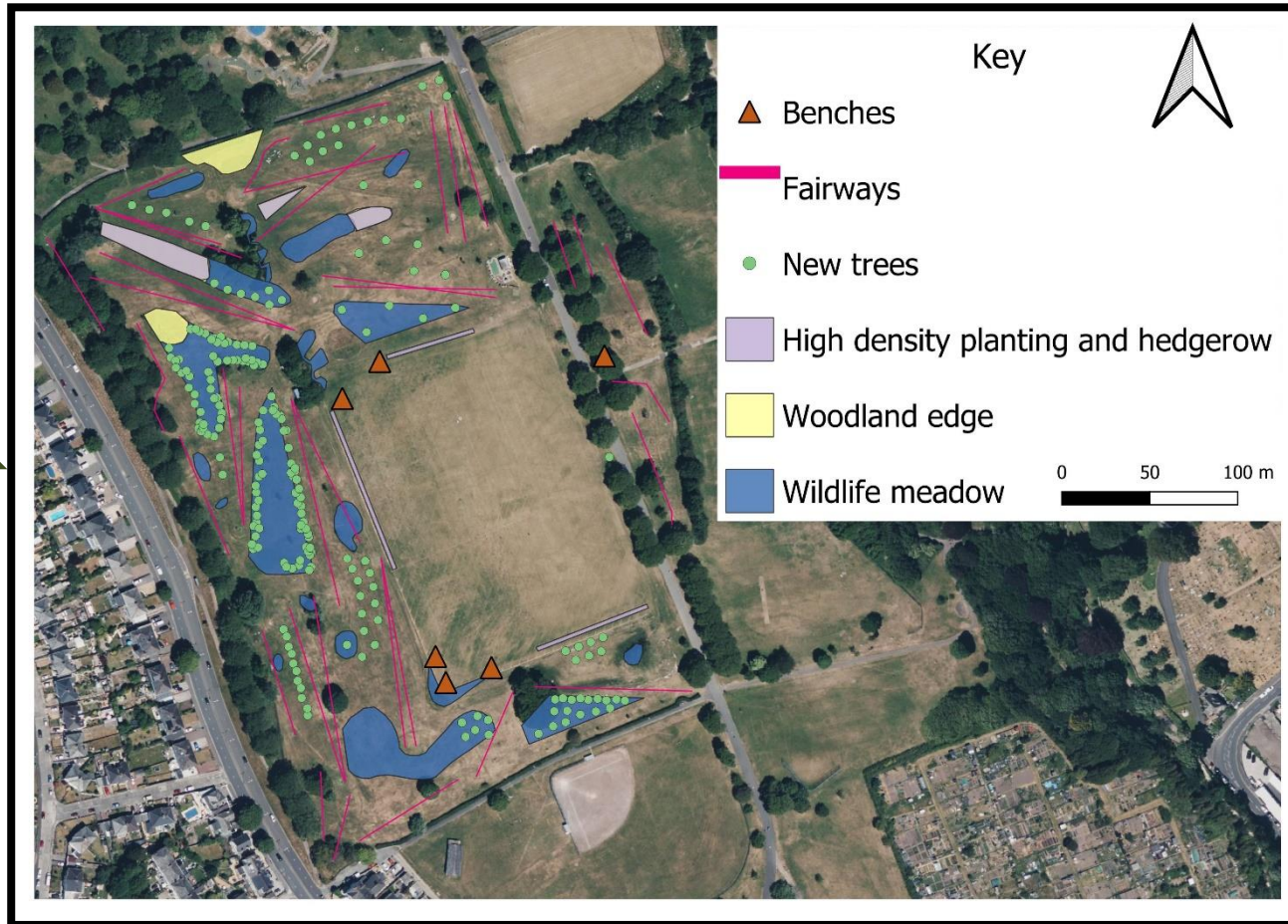
Edible hedge

We will be planting a hedgerow full of edible plants including approximately 20 fruit trees, providing food for both people and wildlife.

New trees

A mix of larger and smaller trees will be planted throughout the course to; line the fairways, shape the course, frame the view to the sea, and provide shade and shelter.

Green Communities and Plymouth South Devon Community Forest have been working with the golf course lease holders to shape the golf course with nature. We are planting over 1000 trees over the course, this includes a mix of small and large native trees, as well as edible shrubs and hedgerow. We will also be sowing approximately 1,000m² of wildlife meadow!
